

Reading Skills & Subskills for ESL Learners (A1-C1) + How to Teach Them

Reading is more than just recognizing words—it involves different **skills** and **subskills** that help learners process and understand texts effectively. Below is a breakdown of the key reading skills **from A1 to C1**, along with **engaging teaching techniques** for each level.

1. Reading Skills & Subskills Overview

Key Reading Skills:

- 1. **Skimming** Quickly reading to get the general idea.
- 2. **Scanning** Looking for specific details.
- 3. Reading for gist (Global Understanding) Understanding the main idea.
- 4. **Reading for detail** Understanding specific information.
- 5. **Inference & Deduction** Understanding implied meaning.
- 6. **Predicting** Guessing content from titles, pictures, or context.
- 7. **Recognizing Discourse Markers** Identifying connectors (e.g., however, therefore, in contrast).
- 2. How to Teach Reading Skills at Each Level
- A1 (Beginner) Basic Understanding
- ★ Focus: Recognizing words, simple comprehension, and basic skimming/scanning.
- **6** Skills & Techniques:
- Skimming (Main Idea Recognition)
 - Activity: Picture Prediction → Show images related to the text and have students guess the topic before reading.
- Scanning (Finding Specific Words)
 - Activity: Word Hunt → Provide a short paragraph with a list of words for students to find as fast as possible.
- Reading for Gist (Global Understanding)
 - Activity: True/False Statements → Give simple yes/no or true/false questions based on the text.



- Reading for Detail (Understanding Sentences)
 - Activity: Fill-in-the-Blanks → Use gap-fill exercises to reinforce vocabulary.
- Predicting (Guessing Meaning from Context)
 - Activity: Matching Words with Pictures → Before reading, give key vocabulary with images.
- A2 (Elementary) Expanding Comprehension
- Focus: Identifying the main idea, finding key details, and understanding word meaning from context.
- **6** Skills & Techniques:
- Skimming (Reading Quickly for the General Idea)
 - Activity: Title & First Sentence Guessing → Students read only the title and first sentence, then predict what the text is about.
- Scanning (Finding Specific Information)
 - Activity: Find the Numbers → Provide a text with dates, numbers, or names for students to locate quickly.
- Inference & Deduction (Understanding Implied Meaning)
 - Activity: Who Said It? → If the text has dialogue, students match statements with the correct character.
- Recognizing Discourse Markers (Logical Connectors)
 - Activity: Sentence Completion → Give students sentences with missing transition words (e.g., because, but, so).
- B1 (Intermediate) Independent Reading
- 🖈 Focus: Distinguishing opinions from facts, summarizing, and recognizing organization in texts.
- **o** Skills & Techniques:
- Skimming & Scanning (Speed Reading Practice)
 - Activity: One-Minute Reading Challenge → Students skim a short text and summarize it in 1-2 sentences.
- Inference (Understanding Indirect Meaning)



- Activity: Character Feelings

 Students read a passage and infer how a character feels.
- Reading for Detail (Supporting Evidence in Texts)
 - Activity: Find the Synonym → Students locate words in the text that match given synonyms.
- Recognizing Text Structure (Headings & Paragraph Order)
 - Activity: Jumbled Paragraphs → Cut up a short text, and students must arrange the paragraphs in the correct order.
- B2 (Upper-Intermediate) Critical Thinking & Analysis
- **Focus:** Evaluating arguments, understanding tone, and analysing text structure.
- **6** Skills & Techniques:
- Identifying Writer's Tone & Purpose
 - Activity: Text Tone Sorting → Give students sentences from different texts (formal, persuasive, humorous) and have them classify the tone.
- Distinguishing Fact from Opinion
 - Activity: Fact or Opinion Debate → Students highlight factual statements in one colour and opinions in another.
- Inference & Reading Between the Lines
 - Activity: What's the Hidden Meaning? → Provide ambiguous sentences and ask students to explain what they suggest.
- Recognizing Discourse Markers (Logical Connectors in Arguments)
 - Activity: Gap-Fill with Transition Words → Provide a text with missing linking words for students to complete.
- C1 (Advanced) Critical Reading & Interpretation
- ★ Focus: Evaluating arguments, identifying bias, and making connections between ideas.
- **©** Skills & Techniques:
- Analysing Arguments & Evaluating Evidence
 - Activity: Persuasive Article Analysis → Students read an opinion article and highlight claims, supporting arguments, and counterarguments.



- Identifying Bias & Subjectivity
 - Activity: Compare Two Articles → Give two texts with different perspectives on the same topic. Students analyze language and tone.
- Recognizing Author's Purpose & Style
 - Activity: Whose Perspective? → Students rewrite a paragraph from another character's or author's perspective.
- Synthesizing Information (Connecting Ideas Across Texts)
 - Activity: Discussion Circles → Students compare ideas from multiple texts and relate them to current events.
- 3. Final Tips for Teaching Reading Skills at Any Level
- Use Authentic Texts Articles, blogs, short stories, and real-world materials.
- Make Reading Interactive Use discussions, role-plays, and debates.
- **Encourage Active Engagement** Have students highlight, annotate, and take notes.
- Mix Reading with Other Skills Follow up with speaking or writing tasks.
- Focus on Student-Cantered Learning Let students explore texts at their own pace.
